1. Find an equation for the plane which contains two lines with parametric equations

$$x = -1 + t, y = 1 + 3t, z = -1 - t \quad \text{and} \quad x = -3 - s, y = 7 + 3s, z = 3 + 2s.$$

cross (X) the correct answer:

A $7x + 2y - 11z = 6$

B $11x + 9y - 2z = 0$

C $6x + y - 2z = -3$

D $3x + y - 6z = 4$

E $9x + y + 6z = -14$

F $9x - y + 6z = -16$

Solution: The normal vector for the plane will be $\pm d_1 \times d_2$, where $d_1 = (1, 3, -1)$ and $d_2 = (-1, 3, 2)$ are direction vectors for the lines above. A computation shows

$$d_1 \times d_2 = \begin{vmatrix} i & j & k \\ 1 & 3 & -1 \\ -1 & 3 & 2 \end{vmatrix} = (9, -1, 6).$$

So the normal vector for the plane is $n = (9, -1, 6)$. Since the plane contains $(-1, 1, -1)$, we get $n \cdot (-1, 1, -1) = -16$. Hence, an equation for the plane is $9x - y + 6z = -16$ and the correct answer is F.

2. Find an equation of the plane passing through the points $P = (0, 0, -3)$ and $Q = (-1, 2, 1)$, and which is parallel to the line L with parametric equation $x = t, y = t, z = -t$.

cross (X) the correct answer:

A $2x + y = -0$

B $-2y + z = -3$

C $-2x - 3y + z = -3$

D $2x - y + z = -3$

E $4x + z = -3$

F $6x + y + z = -3$

Solution. Normal vectors to the plane are perpendicular to the difference $u = Q - P = (-1, 2, 4)$ and to the direction vector $v = (1, 1, -1)$ of L . Hence, normal vectors of the plane are in proportion to $u \times v = (-6, 3, -3) = -3(2, -1, 1)$. So an equation of the plane has the form $2x - y + z = d$. Since $(0, 0, -3)$ is on the plane, $d = -3$ and the correct answer is D.

3. Find an equation of the plane which passes through the point $(1, 1, 1)$ and which is perpendicular to the line whose parametric equations are

$$x = -6 + 2t, \quad y = -3 + 3t, \quad z = 1 - 4t.$$

cross (X) the correct answer:

A $2x + 3y - 4z = -25$

B $2x + 3y - 4z = -10$

C $2x + 3y - 4z = 10$

D $2x + 3y - 4z = 1$

E $2x + 3y + 4z = 9$

F $6x - 3y + z = 2$

Solution: A normal vector for the plane will be a direction vector for this line which is $(2, 3, -4)$. Since the plane contains $(1, 1, 1)$, we get $n \cdot (1, 1, 1) = (2, 3, -4) \cdot (1, 1, 1) = 1$. Hence, an equation for the plane is $2x + 3y - 4z = 1$ and the correct answer is D.

4. Find parametric equations for the line containing the points $(2, 3, -2)$ and $(-2, 0, 4)$.

cross (X) the correct answer:

- A Such a line does not exist
- B $x = 2 + 4t, y = 3 + 3t, z = -2 - 6t$
- C $x = -2 + 4t, y = 1 + 3t, z = 4 + 6t$
- D $x = 2 - 2t, y = 3, z = -2 + 4t$
- E $x = 1 - t, y = 4 + 3t, z = -1 - 6t$
- F $x = 3 + 4t, y = 6 + t, z = -1 - 6t$

Solution: A direction vector for such a line is the difference $P - Q = (4, 3, -6)$. There is only one line above with this direction vector, namely B. This line does pass through both P and Q , so the correct answer is B.

5. Find a scalar equation for the plane with vector parametric equation

$$v = (0, -2, 2) + s(1, 2, -1) + t(2, -1, -4), \quad s, t \in \mathbb{R}.$$

cross (X) the correct answer:

A $9x + 2y + 5z = 6$

B $9x + 5y + 2z = -6$

C $9x + 5y - 2z = -14$

D $9x - 2y + 5z = 14$

E $9x + 2y - 5z = -14$

F $4x + 6y - 9z = -30$

Solution: A normal vector for such a plane will be parallel to

$$d_1 \times d_2 = \begin{vmatrix} i & j & k \\ 1 & 2 & -1 \\ 2 & -1 & -4 \end{vmatrix} = (-9, 2, -5).$$

There is only one plane in the list above with this normal vector, namely D. One can check that this plane does contain the point $(0, -2, 2)$, so the correct answer is D.

6. Find all vectors in \mathbb{R}^3 which are perpendicular to both $u = (-1, 5, 1)$ and $v = (2, 2, 1)$.

cross (X) the correct answer:

A $\{(2, 2, -8)\}$

B $\{(t, t, -4t) \mid t \in \mathbb{R}\}$

C $\{(-t, t, 0) \mid t \in \mathbb{R}\}$

D $\{(t + 1, t + 1, -8) \mid t \in \mathbb{R}\}$

E $\{(0, 0, 0)\}$

F $\{(3, 3, -12)\}$

Solution: Such vectors will be parallel to

$$u \times v = \begin{vmatrix} i & j & k \\ -1 & 5 & 1 \\ 2 & 2 & 1 \end{vmatrix} = (3, 3, -12) = 3(1, 1, -4).$$

So B is the correct answer.

7. A triangle has vertices $A = (1, 1, 1)$, $B = (2, 1, 3)$ and $C = (1, 3, 2)$. Find the cosine of the interior angle at A .

cross (X) the correct answer:

A 1

B $4/5$

C $3/5$

D $2/5$

E $1/5$

F 0

Solution: We take $u = B - A = (1, 2, 0)$ and $v = C - A = (0, 1, 2)$. Then

$$\cos \theta = \frac{u \cdot v}{\|u\| \cdot \|v\|} = \frac{2}{\sqrt{5}\sqrt{5}} = 2/5.$$

So the correct answer is D.

8. Let L be the line through the point $(2, 0, 1)$ parallel to the vector $u = (1, 2, -1)$. Find the point of intersection of L with the plane P given by the equation $x + 2y + z = 23$.

cross (X) the correct answer:

A (11, 4, 4)

B (2, 10, 1)

C (7, 6, 4)

D (7, 10, -4)

E (11, 4, 1)

F (10, 7, -4)

Solution: The line will have parametric equation $x = 2 + s$, $y = 2s$, $z = 1 - s$. Since in addition $x + 2y + z = 23$, we find

$$(2 + s) + 2(2s) + (1 - s) = 23,$$

which gives $s = 5$. Hence, the point is $(7, 10, -4)$, so the correct answer is D

9. Let $u = (3, 6, 3)$ and $v = (2, 1, -1)$.

Find the length of the projection of the vector u along v .

cross (X) the correct answer:

A $\frac{2\sqrt{6}}{3}$

B $\frac{2\sqrt{2}}{3}$

C 0

D $\frac{\sqrt{6}}{2}$

E $\frac{3\sqrt{6}}{2}$

F $\frac{3\sqrt{2}}{2}$

Solution: Since $proj_v u = \frac{u \cdot v}{\|v\|^2}$ we obtain

$$\|proj_v u\| = \frac{|u \cdot v|}{\|v\|^2} \|v\| = \frac{|u \cdot v|}{\|v\|} = \frac{9}{\sqrt{6}} = \frac{3\sqrt{6}}{2}.$$

So the correct answer is E.

10. Find the area of the triangle whose vertices are the points $P = (3, 2, -1)$, $Q = (1, 0, 1)$ and $R = (1, -1, 2)$.

cross (X) the correct answer:

A 4

B $\sqrt{2}$

C $2\sqrt{2}$

D 0

E $4\sqrt{2}$

F 2

Solution: The area is $\frac{1}{2}\|u \times v\|$. Since $u = Q - P = (-2, -2, 2)$ and $v = R - P = (-2, -3, 3)$, we find

$$u \times v = \begin{vmatrix} i & j & k \\ -2 & -2 & 2 \\ -2 & -3 & 3 \end{vmatrix} = 2(0, 1, 1).$$

So $\frac{1}{2}\|u \times v\| = \frac{1}{2}(2\sqrt{2}) = \sqrt{2}$, so the correct answer is B.

The last page (use it for computations)

$$\begin{aligned}\sin\left(\frac{\pi}{6}\right) &= \cos\left(\frac{\pi}{3}\right) = \frac{1}{2}, & \sin\left(\frac{\pi}{3}\right) &= \cos\left(\frac{\pi}{6}\right) = \frac{\sqrt{3}}{2} \\ \sin\left(\frac{\pi}{4}\right) &= \cos\left(\frac{\pi}{4}\right) = \frac{\sqrt{2}}{2}, & \sin(0) &= \cos\left(\frac{\pi}{2}\right) = 0, & \sin\left(\frac{\pi}{2}\right) &= \cos(0) = 1.\end{aligned}$$
